### School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (School Year 2022 - 2023)

This school has 47 classrooms, a multipurpose room with a stage, a band room, a specialized science wing, a gym, and a large school library. The campus was built in 2002. The school is on the same property with Franklin High School, separated by fences and sharing the large library that sits between the two schools. The school has eight classroom pods, with a gym, band room, stage, kitchen classroom, TV production classroom, and two computer labs. The Franklin Community Library serves the middle school, high school and local community, and is the largest school library in the city. The school also has extensive fields for physical education including basketball courts, a football field and track. The gym contains a dance room as well.

The LEA takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional. To assist in this effort, the LEA uses a facility survey instrument developed by the State of California Office of Public School Construction. The results of this survey are available at the district office. Included is information from the facility survey instrument on the condition of the school and the efforts made to ensure that students are provided with a clean, safe, and functional learning environment. Our school received an "Exemplary" status based on the State's definitions for each of the eight categories evaluated, which is the highest rating possible.

The district's maintenance and grounds departments work in concert with the school site custodial team to ensure that school buildings, classrooms, and grounds are maintained at exceptional levels to provide a safe and functional environment for all students. The district utilizes the latest electronic work order system enabling site administration and custodians to communicate maintenance needs, urgent repairs, or necessary projects. Emergency repair needs are immediately resolved by either the school custodian or district maintenance staff. The school's custodians work as a team and with the principal to develop a daily cleaning process and schedule. Each morning the custodian inspects the school prior to students and staff entering school grounds, and the site is fully cleaned each evening. Restrooms are inspected throughout the day to ensure that they are adequately stocked, safe, and sanitary.

The State Deferred Maintenance Program (DMP) was established in 1980 to aid districts in major maintenance projects. Beginning with the 2013-2014 fiscal year and the inception of the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) the State has intended for Deferred Maintenance needs and expenses to be included in the District's LCFF allotment. The district continues to fund routine projects previously considered as part of the State's former DMP at levels required by the State and continues to use local resources.

During the 2021-2022 school year, security cameras were added to the perimeter of campus as part of a district-wide initiative. The cameras are monitored centrally with district safety and security and can be reviewed by district staff upon specific site administrative requests for safety needs.

School safety is the highest priority at Toby Johnson Middle School. Therefore, we are committed to a safe and secure learning environment for every student. Our staff reviewed our School Safety Plan in January 2023. Included in the plan are monitoring practices that not only address student safety during school hours, but before and after school as well. Gates are monitored while open at school start and dismissal and locked during the school day. All visitors sign in when entering our campus and wear identification. Beginning in January 2023, every student or staff member at TJMS is required to wear a school ID visibly displayed when on campus at all times. An "Emergency Handbook," outlining a plan of action for emergencies such as earthquakes, fires, floods, and chemical spills, is kept in the school office as well as each classroom. Random, periodic school safety inspections are conducted by the County of Sacramento. The district's Police Services Department works closely with our school site to provide a safe, secure environment for all students.

Our staff with credentials and special training in Special Education not only assist students with disabilities, but also students in general education who need additional support to meet the standards. Specially trained teams of teachers help our English Learners access the core curriculum. ALL students have access to our Honors program. Students have the opportunity to test and qualify for GATE (Gifted and Talented). Targeted interventions through extended day instruction are provided and available after school. Our Technology Department offers a unique Yearbook and TJTV (Broadcast Journalism) program for students. These programs provide opportunities for students to exercise creativity and enhance technological skills in news casting, graphic design and layout. Our CTE (Career Technical Education) courses prepare students for high school pathways in Computer Science and/or Engineering. In addition to a robust elective program, the school offers after school programs in Theater, Computer Science, Science (Olympiad), Art, Cyber-Patriots, several clubs, and Music. Our award-winning marching band competes in high school competitions, and our programs have been aligned with Franklin High School.

## Professional Development

Our school and district offer a variety of professional learning opportunities for teachers, instructional aides, and non-instructional support staff. Our school has a weekly late start schedule so departments and teams can meet and coordinate curriculum and instruction. Teachers meet to review student work, make determinations about students' strengths and weaknesses, and plan subsequent instruction to meet students' needs. Teachers take part in professional development programs to increase students' conceptual understanding of mathematics, science, reading and writing. Our teachers are dedicated to providing the enhanced strategies available through the common core standards adopted by the state. Additionally, special education teachers and EL teachers have additional opportunities to learn how to best support students with special learning needs. Para educators, school secretaries, office clerks, security and custodians take classes that relate to their work such as learning new computer skills and learning to work more efficiently and in ergonomically correct ways.
