Teacher Credentials and Misassignments

In the 2024-2025 school year, over 99 percent of the district's teachers held full teaching credentials. In addition to being fully credentialed, if a class is 20 percent or more English Learners (EL), the teacher should hold a supplementary authorization to instruct students in learning English or they are considered misassigned. In subjects with a shortage, a fully credentialed teacher is sometimes asked to teach outside of their subject matter competency area until an appropriately credentialed teacher can be hired. In these cases, teachers are counted as misassigned.

Vacancies are defined as a position to which a permanent teacher has not been assigned by the beginning of the course. Most vacancies in our district are in subject areas where qualified teachers are in shortage.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvement

We are located in a suburban neighborhood in South Sacramento. The majority of our students walk to school, drive cars, or take the bus. This school has 24 classrooms, a multipurpose room, a library, computer lab, and an administration building. The main campus was built in 1989. Two portable classrooms serve our Head Start and Title I Preschool classrooms. Our Kindergarten wing has a separate playground from the main playground, and it serves our preschool and kindergarten students. Our main playground serves students in grades 1-6. We share a playing field with the City of Sacramento which is a public shared park. Our MP has a kitchen, and stage. Every classroom is equipped with an interactive board. We have a fully operational computer lab.

The district's M & O department work in connection with the school site custodial team to ensure that school buildings, &grounds are maintained at high levels. The district utilizes an electronic work order system enabling custodians to communicate maintenance needs, repairs, or projects. Emergency repair needs are resolved by either the school custodian or district the school's custodians work as a team to develop a daily cleaning process and schedule. Each morning the custodian inspects the school prior to students and staff entering school grounds. Restrooms are inspected throughout the day to ensure that they are adequately stocked, safe, and sanitary. The Board adopted cleaning standards for all schools in the district. Our school prides itself on staying clean and in good repair.

With the passing of Measure M in November 2016's election, our school did receive updates with flooring, security components, and technology. Our school underwent construction to replace the roofs on many of our buildings on site. We received new carpet, exterior painting and flooring all throughout the school in the summer of 2023. We also had a shade structure built in 2022 that provides shade for our playground. We repaved our blacktop and upgraded our playground with new tether ball poles, volleyball poles, and lines to have adequate games on the play yard.

Professional Development

Our school and district offer many PD opportunities for teachers and staff. All staff participate in Professional Learning Community (PLC) training so that we can continue to provide the best learning opportunities for our students. Teachers use common planning time to meet and review student work, to determine students' strengths and weaknesses. We also have a CCSS Instructional Coach and EL Coach assigned to work with teachers at our site. Our school was the 1st AVID Elementary school wide in EGUSD. Our teachers use strong AVID strategies to support student learning. Finally, the district offers a variety of classes for support staff, Instructional aides, school secretaries, office clerks, and custodians take classes that relate to their work, such as learning new computer skills and learning to work more efficiently. Our school philosophy is that we are lifelong learners.

School Safety Plan

We are committed to providing a safe and secure environment for learning. Our staff reviewed and updated our School Safety Plan in August 2024. The school is monitored and supervised by assigned staff members before and after school, and during lunch and recess. Outside gates are secured and locked, providing a safer environment for students and staff. An "Emergency Handbook", outlining a plan of action for emergencies such as earthquakes, fires, floods, and chemical spills, is kept in the school office. Yearly school safety inspections are conducted by the County of Sacramento. The district's Police Services work closely with our school site to provide a safe, secure environment for all students. Discipline and anti-bullying programs, such as PBIS, and safety procedures are followed. Cameras have been installed and monitor 24 hours per day.

Specialized Programs

We have a highly qualified staff to assist students with special learning needs. Our Learning Center services special education students. We have a Language/Speech Pathologist. Our School Psychologist is assigned to our site 5 days each week and our Mental Health Therapist, Behaviorist and counsellor are here weekly. Last year we hired a mental health counselor 3 days per week who specializes in group and individual counselling. We also have four self contained special education classes on our campus. Our Bilingual Teaching Associates help our English Learners access the core curriculum. Gifted and Talented students participate Math Hoops and CREST. Our Jaguar Club, ASES, after school program provides homework assistance, literacy instruction, and enrichment activities. Reith has a strong student leadership program Students help run our PBIS and character education programs.
